Parallelism: "The inherent vice of capitalism is the <i>unequal sharing of blessing</i> ; the inherent virtue of socialism is the <i>equal sharing of miseries</i> . –Winston Churchill
Antimetabole: Whoever sheds the blood of man, by man shall his blood be shed. - Genesis
Anastrophe: Mind what you have learned. <u>Save you it can.</u> --Yoda
Isocolon: Climate is what we expect; weather is what we get. – Mark Twain
Climax: I think we've reached a point of great decision, not just for our nation, not only for all humanity, but for life upon the earth.
Asyndeton: ...that we shall pay any price, bear any burden, meet any hardship, support any friend, oppose any foe to assure the survival and the success of liberty. –John F. Kennedy
Anaphora: He came as conqueror. He came as ally. He came as a stranger. He came as brother.
Antithesis: "You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I tell you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you'" –Jesus
Give me liberty or give me death! –Patrick Henry
Metaphor/Personification: A heart of stone.
Synecdoche/Metonymy: The pen is mightier than the sword.
Hyperbole: The bag weighed a ton.
Litote: And after all, a nuclear war would only be the end of the world
Antanacsis: I just wanna live while I'm alive. – Bon Jovi
Zeugma: You are free to execute your laws, and your citizens, as you see fit. – Star Trek
Anthimeria: He ninja'd my idea.
Paradox/Oxymoron: The quiet was deafening
Epistrophe: "There is no Negro problem. There is no Southern problem. There is no Northern problem. There is only an American problem." –Lyndon B Johnson
Rhetorical Question: "How much longer must our people endure this injustice?"
Snowclone: To boldly split infinitives that no man had split before,
Hendiadris: (three words are used to express one idea) "Truth, Justice, and the American Way"
Anticlimax: Die and endow a college or a cat.
Simile: His arguments withered like grapevines in the fall.
